In a time of serious social fragmentation, we have been a voice of reconciliation with justice.


In a time of anxiety and fear, we have been a source of courage and generosity.

CHAIR OF DEACONS LETTER

By all accounts and measures, this was an exceptional year in our nation, our community, and Broadway. In this year, we've lived through a generational public health crisis coupled with economic turmoil and social displacement. We've witnessed pervasive racial injustices that have laid bare the systemic racism that continues to exist in our society. And we've experienced continued political and social unrest. With all that has happened in this year, is it wrong to ask "Where is God?" I will tell you where I saw God this year. I saw God at our beloved Broadway, preparing our journey before we had any idea of the road ahead.

In the summer and fall of 2019, Ryon Price, the staff and Personnel Committee, with guidance from the Board of Deacons, reimagined our ministerial structure. In particular, Fran Patterson became the Pastor of Congregational Care and Jennifer Davis became the Pastor of Family Ministries. Imagine being in a pandemic without a pastor such as Fran caring for the body of Christ? Imagine being dislocated without a pastor such as Jennifer leading our children, youth, and their families? Further, Peter Nelson joined Broadway in December 2019 on a part-time basis to assist with the Agape Meal and Room in the Inn. As the pandemic took hold, Peter joined Broadway full-time as Interim Director of Community Ministries and Partnerships, which gave Broadway the bandwidth to respond quickly to the needs of our members and community in new and supportive ways. This response was supported by many volunteers and the Missions Committee. Imagine responding to a pandemic without Broadway's infrastructure built over decades?

Early in 2019, with the support of the Board of Deacons, Ryon and I engaged the congregation in a discussion about same-sex weddings. The agenda was simple: we shared our thoughts and we listened to yours. By-and-large, what we heard was members listening to one another, being open and vulnerable with each other, and, more than anything, caring for one another. This year, in response to countless racial injustices, Ryon and Irie Price led us in book studies, and I saw this same spirit – listening, self-examination, reflection and commitment to community. This spirit can only be gifted by the Holy Spirit, and while these discussions are a good start, they are only a start to the hard road that lies ahead. God is preparing Broadway and my prayer is that we be open to the Holy Spirit as we travel a new road to the full embodiment of the body of Christ.

The last example of where I've seen God this year is in the members of Broadway, through your service, stewardship, committee and Board service, and care for one another. It is truly remarkable to see how you've responded in the face of adversity, and you give me courage for the days ahead.

This year, God was with us before we were even there. He is and he was. He has prepared our way and given us the faith to follow. Let us go then, follow him, and do the work of our Lord.

Online Worship Service

The Music and Worship Ministry is often the first impression people see of our church and that has become more evident in this online-only, COVID-19 environment.

Broadway began streaming worship services in 2018. The past two years provided valuable experience for us when Broadway decided to suspend in-person worship services in March 2020 and move services exclusively online. While many churches struggled with establishing live stream accounts and setting up technology, Broadway's AV team was able to build on our existing live steam worship experience.

Broadway continues to broadcast a live worship service each Sunday at 10:50 from the Sanctuary through YouTube, Facebook, and the church's website. We are thankful for the technology that allows us to worship together even as we maintain safe social distancing.

This team has worked diligently over the past nine months to present Broadway's worship experience online, bringing us together as a Christian community both near and far.

Live Stream Choral Music

Congregational hymns and choral singing are important parts of worship at Broadway, but they are difficult to accomplish during a pandemic.

Broadway's live stream worship services have been enriched by our TCU Choral Scholars, who have led the hymns each week. Additionally, members of Broadway's Chancel Choir sang congregational hymns each week as part of our live streamed services.

A repertoire of recorded anthems by the Chancel and Chapel Choirs, were used each week as part of our live stream service.

Broadway Series

The 2019-20 Broadway Series ended on a high note. Richard Elliot presented a spectacular recital in September 2019, and Myles Garver and the other TCU Choral Scholars gave a recital of arias, German lieder, and motets in October. December brought our annual Messiah Sing, the Texas Boys Choir's Christmas Concert, and our Advent Festival in worship. Organist Clive Driskill-Smith closed the season in February with a wonderful performance.

The COVID crisis in March suspended the start of the 2020-21 Broadway Series when Lenten organ recitals were cancelled. Given the success of Broadway's live stream Sunday worship services, the Broadway Series Chamber Concert and Art Songs and Arias events transitioned online.

Children and Youth Music Programs

Emily Davis leads Broadway's music programs for children and youth. The Children's Choir (grades 1-4), Concord Choir (grades 5-6), and the Chapel Choir (grades 7-12) all perform regularly in worship services and special programs.

Choirs were preparing for Palm Sunday, summer programs and tours when the COVID-19 crisis started. Plans for tours, programs, and music camp were put on hold in 2020. However, we look forward to restarting these programs when it is safe to do so in 2021.

An important development this year has been the formation of Family Ministries at Broadway. This new ministry model brings together Preschool, Children, Club 56, and Youth into one ministry area to support parents and caregivers with children from birth through high school and all the transitions in between.

Family Ministry's goal is to develop programming and create experiences that consider the whole family's needs as well as the important aspects of faith development from birth through 12th grade.

This ministry model supports Broadway's goal to be an intergenerational church—through building relationships, serving together, discipleship, and worship—and partnering with parents and caregivers to provide the greatest impact on the spiritual development of children.

Family Ministries Mission Statement:

Through a partnership with families and an inclusive community of faith, we will nurture lifelong followers of Jesus who love God and neighbor.

Relay for Kindness

As the 2019 school year started, Broadway children and youth participated in a project to collect supplies for families in transition along the Texas-Mexico border. Churches from Missouri to Texas were part of the relay that delivered supplies to Eagle Pass, TX. Children and youth helped collect supplies and load the trucks. They also learned about the important work of CBF field personnel serving along the Texas border.

Youth Spring Break Mission Trip

Each year, our youth dedicate part of their spring break to a missions project. This year, Broadway's youth contributed some amazing work as part of the Camp Broadway renovation. Projects included the bath house, hiking trails, lodge improvements, and construction of a new gaga ball pit. This mission trip concluded just before the COVID-19 outbreak.

COVID-19 Response

Since the start of the COVID-19 crisis and the need for safe social distancing, we have made efforts to connect with children, youth, and their families. Zoom Sunday school is offered for grades 1-6. We have been glad to see so many of our children participate and enjoy learning Bible stories together. Our preschoolers have had Zoom meet-up classes with teachers and parents. Pre-school Coordinator, Mary Jesse has offered a weekly story time on Facebook, a favorite for preschoolers, and some adults, too!

Concerns about COVID-19 caused cancellation of many activities including Vacation Bible School, Music Camp, summer camps for children and youth, Chapel Choir and Missions tour, and Trunk or Treat. These activities are not only important for the faith development of our children and youth, but also serve as some of our most important outreach activities to our neighborhood and community.

Youth participate in in-person Sunday School activities following safe social distancing and strong safety protocols. In the early fall, youth met for swim and study parties in member's backyards. More recently, youth have met in the courtyard and church in small groups for fellowship and Bible study.

We continue to find creative ways during the pandemic to offer these important activities and events and look forward to what Family Ministries can offer when we move back to regular in-person worship and activities. This included creating a 2020 time capsule to be buried at Camp Broadway.

The Family Ministries theme this year was "Reset," a theme that continues to provide us courage and hope as we look to 2021.

The essential services provided through Broadway's Community Center and ministries became even more important during the COVID-19 crisis; however, it was important to make changes to how those services were administered in order to ensure everyone's safety.

In March, Broadway closed the Community Center to guests and limited the number of volunteers in the facility. Everyone entering the building was required to wear a mask and maintain a safe social distance of six feet or more. We also instituted mandatory temperature checks and a self-disclosure form related to COVID symptoms and exposure.

Our May Street Market food pantry provides groceries to individuals and families experiencing food insecurity. Prior to the pandemic, guests could shop the aisles in the market and select the food items they needed. For safety reasons, guests now receive pre-packaged groceries delivered curbside. Since the start of the pandemic in March, we have provided groceries to 80 households each week. This represents a significant increase from last year, and we expect those numbers to continue to rise as economic and health issues related to the pandemic continue.

The COVID-19 crisis caused some ministries to be suspended altogether due to safety concerns, including Room in the Inn and the Mobile Food Pantry Express. However we have found other ways to meet neighbor's needs including our Fresh and Free food program, which distributed 5,900 boxes of fresh food and produce between May and September.

In October, Broadway added a new cargo van to support community ministries. The van was made possible through a grant from the Ryan Foundation. The van is used weekly to make food pickups from Tarrant Area Food Bank, meal deliveries, and other supplies. We give thanks to God for this generous gift.

Throughout the pandemic, Broadway staff and volunteers have risen to the occasion: making sandwiches for sack lunches, packing groceries, shopping for clothes, sewing masks, organizing uniforms, distributing books, delivering meals and food boxes, either donating or giving generously, and praying for our guests and neighbors. We are so grateful for all we've been able to provide in this critical time.

In response to the rising demand for essential services in May, Broadway hired Peter Nelson as Interim Director of Community Ministries and Partnerships. Peter has worked in corporate training and human resources for over 25 years and brings a wealth of management experience. He studied at Dallas Seminary, Southwestern Seminary, and, most recently, Fuller Seminary. Under Peter's leadership, Broadway's community ministries expanded during the pandemic to include partnerships with Clayton Youth Services, Samaritan House, and the Fort Worth ISD, leading to Broadway's recognition as a Hometown Hero by Fort Worth ISD.



Community Partnerships

In 2019, Broadway began a new, collaborative approach to our campus, in addition to Tarrant County Clubhouse we welcomed two new partners with whom we share space: Our Mother of Perpetual Help and Shady Oak Academy. We are grateful for these partners and the essential services they provide to special needs students and their families. Both schools have continued to meet during the COVID-19 crisis.

Fort Worth ISD & Reading Partners North Texas

Many students and families rely on public schools for much more than just education. Students experiencing food insecurity rely on the schools to provide nutritious meals throughout day. When Fort Worth ISD closed campuses due to the COVID-19 virus, some families lost access to food resources. Beginning in April, Broadway partnered with the Fort Worth ISD to deliver food each week to these families helping to ensure all students maintained access to the nutrition they need to be successful at school. This partnership began with five families in April, expanding to 10 families by June.

Thanks to a generous donation from Reading Partners North Texas, Broadway members distributed over 5,000 books to FWISD students and families. These resources helped promote healthy reading habits while students participated in on-line learning.

Clayton Youth Services

Concerns over COVID-19 led the Fort Worth ISD to keep their campuses closed at the beginning of the 2020-21 school year. While this decision helped ensure the safety of teachers, staff, and students, it created a hardship for parents and guardians of school-age children who had to balance athome school support and work requirements.

Broadway partnered with Clayton Youth Services to provide childcare and school support for 60 students in our children's ministry area. Clayton implemented thorough safety protocols to protect students and staff. Services began in

August and continued until all FWISD campuses reopened

Samaritan House

for students in mid-October.

At the outset of the COVID-19 crisis, our neighbors at Samaritan House decided to close one of their campuses, located just two blocks south of our church. This facility serves single men and women who have experienced homelessness and are living with HIV/AIDS. These neighbors are among the most vulnerable in our community. Starting in May, Broadway began providing weekly hot meals to the residents at Samaritan House. Meals are delivered three times per week to over 50 residents. Meals are prepared in Broadway's kitchen and delivered to Samaritan House by Broadway volunteers. From May through September, Broadway has provided over 3,300 meals and we will continue to provide these meals to our neighbors while the Samaritan House campus remains closed.

"As a parent in education, I struggled with not having an option for my children for virtual school. The stress of trying to work at home while simultaneously support my children's learning was straining my relationship with my kids. I appreciate that Broadway provided a space for a well-known program like Clayton Yes! to be able to support my children's learning so I could then focus on providing counseling services and meeting needs to the students in my campus."

Agape Meal

This year marks the 25th anniversary of Broadway's Agape Meal. For the last two and a half decades, friends and neighbors have gathered to share a meal, fellowship, and worship together. Since its start in April 1995, the Agape Meal has strived to be more than just a source for food. We have intentionally created ways to build relationships as well as to recognize and celebrate the gifts of all our guests. Our goal is to let everyone know they are welcome and to experience the extravagant hospitality that Broadway is known for. Guests receive a hot towel as they enter. Table hosts greet friends and neighbors. Food is served family style. As we gather, we share blessings, music, prayers, and a reminder that "God wants you to have this bread." After the meal, guests are invited to stay for a worship service and communion.

We had planned to celebrate the 25th anniversary milestone in April; however, the COVID-19 crisis delayed the celebration and has caused us to make significant changes to how we serve our weekly Agape Meal. For safety reasons, we no longer gather around the table in Fellowship Hall. Instead, we serve hot, to-go meals just outside the Community Center entrance. We still share words of blessings, prayers, and a meal together, but now with safe social distancing, masks, and lots of hand sanitizer. Each week, we serve 75-100 meals to our friends and neighbors in need. We are thankful we can continue this wonderful ministry that has been a part of Broadway for 25 years, even in this time of pandemic.

"The COVID-19 crisis resulted in Samaritan House making the difficult decision to become a closed campus in order to protect the health and welfare of our most vulnerable residents. When we shared this with the community, long-time Samaritan House partner Broadway Baptist Church, immediately reached out and asked how they could help. From the beginning of May, Broadway has provided weekly meals to our residents. With the continued support and partnership of Broadway, we are able to provide hope and a healthy home to the residents of Samaritan House."

As a multi-generational church, we have the sacred opportunity to walk with one another through the joy of birth, the grief of death, and every hurt and hope in-between. We have several specific ministries to help us care for each other. Congregational care has been particularly important during the COVID-19 crisis.

Stephen Ministry

Stephen ministers walk beside those experiencing loss, grief and sadness brought on by bereavement or change. Although one-on-one visits have been suspended during the pandemic, personal care is being given in new, creative ways. Our Stephen Ministers have continued to stay in contact with their Care Receivers, still offering support to those in need in this uniquely challenging time.

Homebound Ministry

The Broadway Homebound Ministry visits and stays in touch with our members who are unable to be at church on a regular basis. We currently have 22 homebound members and 15 homebound ministers who care for them by sending cards, emails and phone calls helping keep these precious members connected to Broadway and us to them. Though the pandemic has limited in-person visits, the advent of virtual visitation has allowed us to connect with our homebound members increasingly meaningful and inclusive ways.

Congregational Care

Members of the Congregational Care Committee offer help for our members in a variety of ways. This year the Committee delivered Easter and Christmas baskets and Broadway yard signs to various homebound members. Additionally, in response to the COVID-19 crisis and the Church's inability to meet together in person, Broadway Deacons began a virtual visitation in order to keep connected with members and help meet the ongoing and critical needs.

Broadway Cares

The economic shutdown of 2020 affected many individuals and families. In order to help those affected, Broadway established a financial grants program to bring relief to those facing financial hardships during the pandemic. To date, Broadway has received in excess of \$10,000 to aid this program. Some Broadway members donated the entirety of their CARES Act stimulus checks to help fellow members in need.

Shepherds Ministry

This group recognizes the birthdays and church anniversaries of Broadway members. In the midst of the pandemic, this ministry has been a wonderful help to keep members feeling connected and valued. Our Shepherds call and send notes each week, and help our Pastors stay up to date about particular milestones in members' lives.



Sunday School Classes and Small Groups


This past year, Broadway added two new classes. The Koinonia Class is designed primarily for the Gen X age group and the Journey Inward, Journey Outward class is open to all and focuses on spiritual disciplines and practices as they relate to social justice. These two additions bring the total adult classes and groups to 24. In the midst of the pandemic, online programs such as Zoom allowed for adult Sunday school classes to continue meeting. Virtual classes and social gatherings have helped keep members connected, maintaining a sense of community.

Becoming Broadway

This class is designed for new members or those thinking about becoming members at Broadway. Participants learn about the history, mission, and values of the church as well as opportunities for spiritual formation and ways to get involved in ministry. With the onset of COVID-19, this class was offered virtually to 15 new and prospective members participating via Zoom.

Online Book Studies and Conversations

Since the start of the COVID-19 crisis, Broadway has significantly increased its engagement with its membership and the broader community at-large, centering conversation around some of the most important issues facing our society and world.

Following the murder of George Floyd and the subsequent protests against racism this summer, Broadway offered a six-week book study on Ibrahim Kendi's book, How to be an Anti-Racist. The discussion was led by Senior Pastor, Ryon Price, and his spouse, Irie Price. Over 300 people registered for the book discussion from all over the country. Each week we had over 250 participants engage in the conversation.

The success of that online study led Broadway to offer a follow-up study based on Robert P. Jones's book, White Too Long. The book examines the role the church has played in promoting and protecting white privilege and white supremacy in America. Senior Pastor Ryon Price led the four-week study. Each week featured special guests to enrich the dialogue. These conversations have served as a model to ministers and other church leaders across the country.

Pastor Ryon also initiated a program of "Courageous Conversations", where he spoke with various civic and religious leaders about pressing issues in our society. Guests to date have included Pastor Melvin Wilson, Senior Pastor of Baker Chapel African a Methodist Episcopal Church in Fort Worth; Estrus Tucker, Fort Worth community and civic leader; and Bishop Malkhaz Songulashvili, human rights activist and Metropolitan Bishop of Peace Cathedral Tiblisi, Republic of Georgia.



This year saw an incredible communications and membership engagement growth with the launch of a new database, new website, new mobile app, and improved social media usage. Broadway's increased suite of communication vehicles allowed for the church to maintain critical connection with members and expand its online outreach in exciting ways.

New Membership Database

In August of 2019 we converted our database to a more robust cloud based system, ShelbyNext, which provides improved system integrations and more efficient data management. In addition to these current enhancements, we plan to launch a mobile check-in feature for worship services and other Family Ministries events.

New Mobile App

Broadway launched its new mobile app in August of 2020. Member specific features include an interactive church directory, and quick and secure access to individual giving information. All users can watch full worship services, see current events, give, complete registration forms, contact forms, and submit prayer requests online. Compatible with both iOS and Android devices, this new mobile tool will continue to grow and offer more features in the new year.

New Website

In August of 2020 Broadway launched a modern new website with user friendly navigation, interactive forms and contact information, narrative image galleries, and beautiful new intuitive site pages. The new broadwaybc.org captures the life and mission of the church and is a great front door for Broadway.





Social Media Presence

Broadway's social media presence experienced tremendous growth amidst the pandemic. The main social media platforms of YouTube, Facebook, and Instagram have broadened our online community well beyond the geographic boundaries of Ft. Worth.


Analytics reports from YouTube and Facebook show that online worshipers and program attendees are participating from as far as Brazil, India, Alaska and across the continental US. Members and former members are reconnecting online during worship and extended family and friends are now "virtually" sitting in the pews. Broadway members are creatively passing the peace virtually through comments and reactions shared live. Our livestream services and programs are hosted by Broadway's YouTube channel and integrated into the website and Facebook page respectively, allowing people multiple ways to watch and interact.

Analytics Show Growth

The analytics for YouTube, our primary livestream channel, show the incredible growth in our overall reach since March of 2020. Prior to the COVID crisis we averaged 6,900 views a year. This year we have seen an astounding 522 percent increase in views, totaling 36,000 views to date. Subscribers to our YouTube channel have increased by 200 percent. Broadway's reach is far and wide and we receive weekly reports from virtual worshipers and friends who express their thanks for who Broadway is and what we offer.

In March 2020, the administrative team led in an accounting conversion to ShelbyNext a cloud based database system. While their responsibilities involve working with numbers and systems, their dedication to God and heart for the mission of Broadway are apparent in everything they do.

FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

Broadway's ministries are funded by the generous gifts of the congregation and people outside the church who believe in our mission. Broadway has a \$1.8 million operating budget and designated funds of approximately \$1 million. The nature of the designated funds is such that the balance fluctuates throughout the year depending on the amount of gifts and ministry expenses. Several of Broadway's ministries are funded almost entirely from designated gifts.

Like many churches, Broadway is dependent on future giving to pay for future endeavors. We are very grateful for all who give to the ministries of Broadway Baptist Church, either through pledges to the operating budget or gifts to the designated funds. Broadway has an operating line of credit which was originally set up for the purpose of evening out cash flow. In more recent years, there has been a greater reliance on the line of credit for ongoing expenses.

In 2020, the congregation voted on a \$150,000 decrease to the annual budget to address this area of concern. While we were able to completely pay off the line of credit at the beginning of the current budget year with prepaid pledges, we expect to access the line of credit in future months. The adjustment to the budget has given the church the opportunity to make incremental reductions in the dependence on the line of credit.

The only other debt of the church is the Sacred Spaces note payable which currently stands at approximately \$1.4 million. The note is a balloon note that matures on February 28, 2029.Broadway budgets for monthly principal and interest payments on the Sacred Spaces note. Over and above gifts given for the purpose of reducing the Sacred Spaces note are applied directly to principal.





FUTURE VISION

This year our Broadway Youth Group is creating a time capsule with which to remember this extraordinary and challenging year. Some of the items our youth are enclosing in the capsule include: a mask, a bottle of hand sanitizer, a Black Lives Matter message, and (of course) a ZOOM app image. Quite apropos.

In the Bible, just before Israel's exile, the prophet Jeremiah took a clay jar and also made a kind of time capsule. Inside the jar he included the deed of a lot of land he purchased just as the Israelites were being carried away into Babylon. Jeremiah purchased the lot as a sign of hope to his people – to signify his belief in the eventual return of the people to the Promised Land.

For the past seven months we've all been living in exile. Displaced from our beautiful sanctuary, places of work, family and loved ones, and regular rhythms of life, we've all been exiled in some way or another. Yet, we've done what Jeremiah did; we've bought into the lot at 305 West Broadway as a sign of our faith in the future of our Church even amidst these challenging and uncertain times.

Even more, we've lived out the instructions Jeremiah gave to the Israelites as they were being carried off into exile. "Plant gardens . . . marry and have sons and daughter . . . increase in number; do not decrease," he told them. "Seek the peace and prosperity of the city."

Our city needs us now. It needs the peace with justice we speak of and live out. It needs our care for the community and neighbors we provide day in and day out. It needs our hope – our faith in God who, as the old hymn says, has been "our help in ages past" and is "our hope for years to come."

Years from now, someone will open the time capsule on this year of our lives. As they do they will wonder what we stood for and did in the moment. And when they unseal the jar, I think they'll be glad to discover that there was a Church at the lot at 305 W Broadway in Fort Worth, TX which stood for Christ's grace and truth, justice and love at just such a time as this.

May it be so now in our year of exile, and in all the other years that are to come also . . .
